Security Occupation

Employees within the Security occupation develop, evaluate and implement tactics for protecting the Agency's resources from unauthorized disclosure, theft, assault, damage or espionage.

Facilities & Engineering Occupation

Employees within the Facilities occupation perform facility management operations by utilizing their Civil, Electrical or Mechanical engineering expertise while in support of the NGA's physical assets and mission.

Medical & Clinical Occupation

Employees within the Medical & Clinical occupation will detect, deter, and mitigate personnel behaviors that may harm or undermine the Agency's assets, critical infrastructure and successful mission accomplishment.

TO QUALIFY

A degree in criminal justice/criminology, homeland security, law enforcement, public safety administration or related area of study.

OR

Relevant experience that demonstrates the knowledge of basic laws and regulations, as well as law enforcement operations, practices and techniques may be considered in lieu of a relevant degree.

KEY COMPETENCIES

Key competencies may include, but are not limited to: data analysis, investigation and inquires, law enforcement, risk management, security awareness and vulnerabilities assessment.

TO QUALIFY

A degree in architecture, engineering science, environmental resources, occupational health or related area of study.

OR

Relevant experience in a closely related area may be considered in lieu of a relevant degree.

KEY COMPETENCIES

Key competencies may include, but are not limited to: blueprint and schematics, building operations and oversight, contract performance management, facilities design, feasibility analysis, project management, sustainability and research methodology.

TO QUALIFY

A doctorate level degree in clinical psychology, counseling psychology, medicine, osteopathy or related area of study.

OR

Relevant experience requires practitioners to hold a full, current, and unrestricted license to practice at the doctoral level in a State, Territory, Commonwealth of the United States (e.g., Puerto Rico), or the District of Columbia.

KEY COMPETENCIES

Key competencies may include, but are not limited to: advising, behavioral analysis, clinical medicine, drug testing and evaluation.

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
